Geography: It's on the east coast of America.



US State you are reporting on: South Carolina

Why is it called that: The Carolinas were named after King Charles I of England.

Capital city: Columbia

Population: 5.27 million

History: In 1670, the English established a large settlement in the region. Then in 1710 they divided the territory into two colonies: North Carolina and South Carolina. Soon after, European settlers came to build plantation to grow rice and indigo, a natural dye used to colour cotton. Slaves were brought from Africa to work those plantations.

Surrounding States: South Carolina is surrounded by North Carolina and Georgia.

Geography and Landforms: The Atlantic Coastal Plain covers the remaining 2/3 of the state, extending west from the ocean, where the land is generally flat and includes rivers and swamps. The coastline also features sandy beaches such as Myrtle Beach. Farther inland are fertile hills. The central part of the plain contains the forested Pine Barrens.

A famous Landmark: A famous landmark in South Carolina is Atalaya Castle. It was built between 1931 and 1933.



Other fun/interesting facts:

South Carolina's Atlantic coastlines stretch over 187 miles!

South Carolina's nickname is The Palmetto State. South Carolina became a U.S. state in 1729. South Carolina was the first state to leave the Union in the years leading up to the Civil war, which started in 1861. It rejoined the United States in 1868.
